Marian University recently welcomed a number two administrator to our campus leadership team. Dr. Daniel J. Maloney, a faculty member from Marian's School of Education, accepted the position as the University's founding provost and began his duties in January.

The role of Marian's provost is vast and, at times, complex; however, Dr. Maloney is up to the challenge. He directs a leadership team that includes Academic Affairs, Enrollment Management, Financial Affairs, Strategic Planning,

Technology, as well as the McNair, Thanatology and Title III programs. In a few short months, Maloney has already learned a great deal from this team, discovering how he can be of assistance, and evaluating how each area can help Marian fulfill its vision.

Before coming to Marian, Maloney was vice president/chief operating officer and professor of educational leadership and counseling psychology at Saint Mary's University of Minnesota Twin Cities Campus (Minneapolis) from 1997–2001. At Saint Mary's University of Minnesota Winona campus, he served from 1985–1994 as vice president for student development, interim president, vice president for finance and administration, and founder and executive

director of the De La Salle Language Institute. He also was dean of the Graduate School and associate professor of education and counseling psychology at Immaculata University (PA) from 1994 to 1997.

Joining the Marian family seven years ago as a professor in the Leadership Studies graduate program in the School of Education, Maloney immersed himself in Marian. "One of the great things about Marian is the ambience of family; it's a community," he says.

Maloney is excited about his partnership with President Baltodano because, he says, she has already helped us to

evaluate our potential. "With our president's leadership, you have to be excited about our future and where our vision may bring us," Maloney says. "People here have a tremendous amount of talent and do great work. I know we can build on it to take us to the next level."

And what does the future hold for Marian? Guided by our strategic plan and campus master plan we look forward to new buildings, additional academic programs, and transitions from academic divisions to schools.
